2023 Community Needs Assessment Summary

Putnam County Community Foundation

- Mission: The Putnam County Community Foundation (PCCF) partners with those who give to enrich the quality of life and strengthen community for this and future generations.
- Asset Development: Develop relationships with donors; invest and protect the principal of donor gifts; distribute grants based on charitable intent of donors
- Broad, Flexible Grantmaking: Understand community needs; re-direct charitable dollars as community needs change; can be proactive or responsive
- Community Leadership: Many ways to play a leadership role
 - Community Needs Assessment should guide how PCCF chooses to play this role

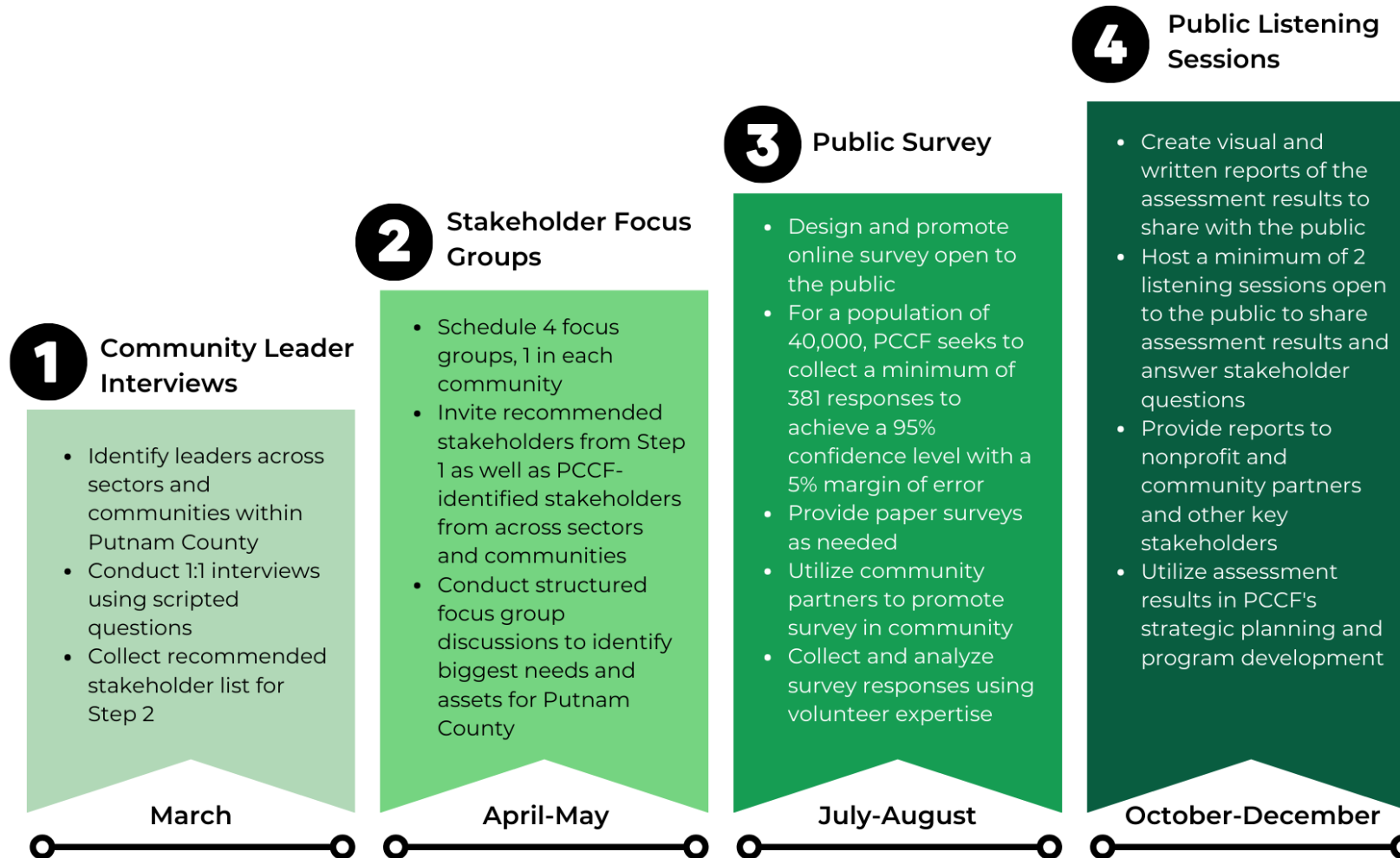
Purpose of the Community Needs Assessment

- Goals of the Community Needs Assessment:
 1. Identify and prioritize needs and assets in Putnam County;
 2. Unite organizations and resources; and
 3. Create solutions that produce significant and lasting results.
- Convene our community's decision-makers to create data-informed solutions based on the issues identified most by community members
- Guidance for our grantmaking and other strategic initiatives
- Publicly share common data for local organizations and leaders to consider in planning future programs and initiatives

Preparations and Planning

- Identify and learn from peer organizations in other communities which have successfully implemented a needs assessment
 - Hendricks County, Boone County, United Way of Central Indiana
- Collect guidance and input from PCCF Board
- Create plan with measurable goals
 - Include strategic and intentional ways to focus efforts on community voice
 - Identify [U.S. Census Data](#) points to use as benchmarks for data collection

Process



What We Learned



Phase 1: Interviews

- 16 one-on-one interviews conducted by PCCF staff members with local leaders from a variety of industries and backgrounds
- Participants chosen by PCCF staff and board members
- Scripted questions to collect similar data points across interviews
- Gather references for Phase 2 participants and informed Phase 2 process

Phase 2: Focus Groups

- 5 community focus groups with 36 participants from across the county from a variety of industries and backgrounds
- Participants recommended by Phase 1 participants, PCCF staff and board
- Facilitated by trusted community member using scripted guide to collect similar data points based on feedback from Phase 1

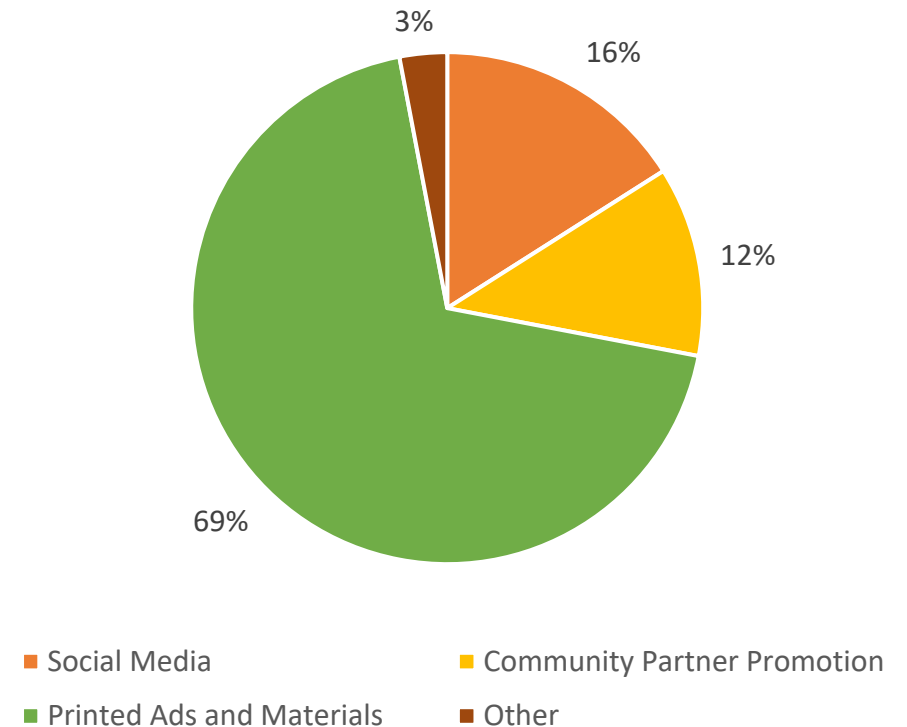
Special Considerations

- Housing might include opinions about:
 - *Affordable* housing options
 - *Diversity* of housing options
 - *Available* housing options
- Mental Health and Addiction might include opinions about:
 - Mental health *treatment* options
 - Mental health *resources*
 - *Addiction* treatment options and resources
- Childcare might include opinions about:
 - *Affordable early childhood education* options
 - *Affordable childcare* options
 - *High-quality* early childhood education and/or childcare options

Phase 3: Public Survey

- Phase 3: Community Needs Assessment public survey was distributed online using Survey Monkey
- 1,206 total responses collected between July 7-August 15, 2023
 - [Sample size](#) provides data that is 99% accurate with a 4% margin of error
- The survey was promoted in a variety of ways including on social media, in local print and digital ads, via local K-12 schools, through Community Partners, etc.

Survey Design and Benchmarks

- Questions were developed using peer organizations' needs assessments and with input from a select group of community members
- Goals for survey efficacy were set based on recent [U.S. Census Data](#) including county population, employment and income, housing and other data points.

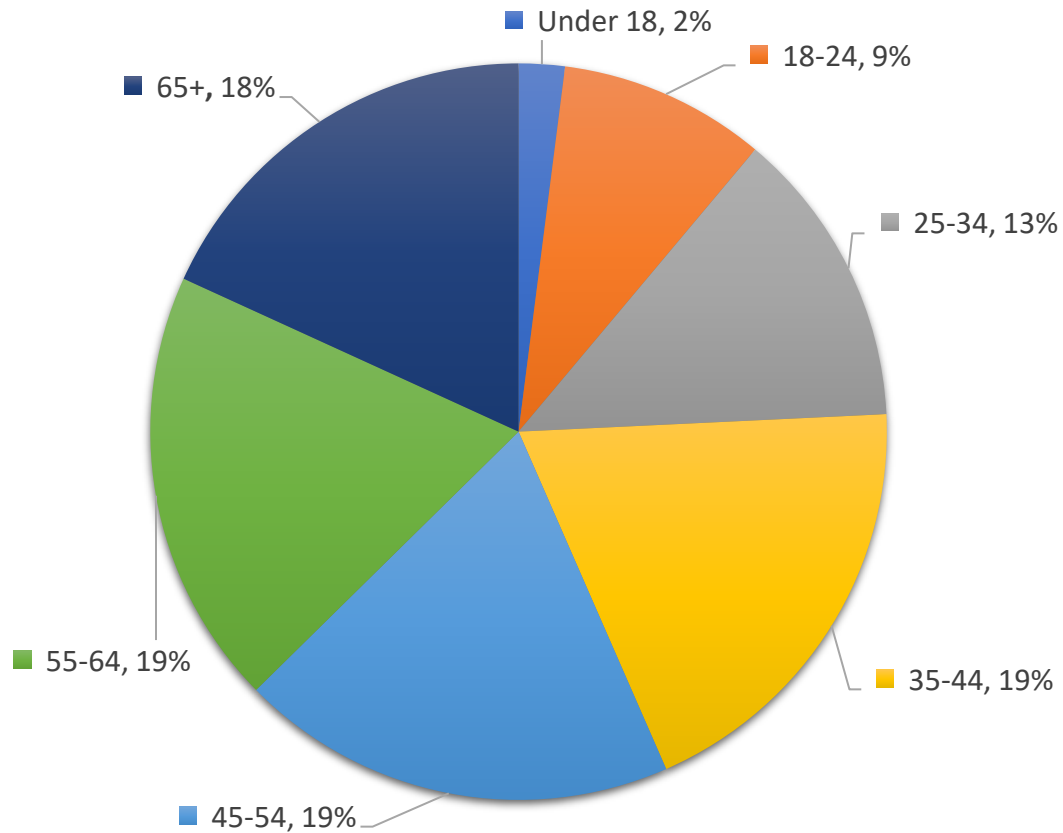

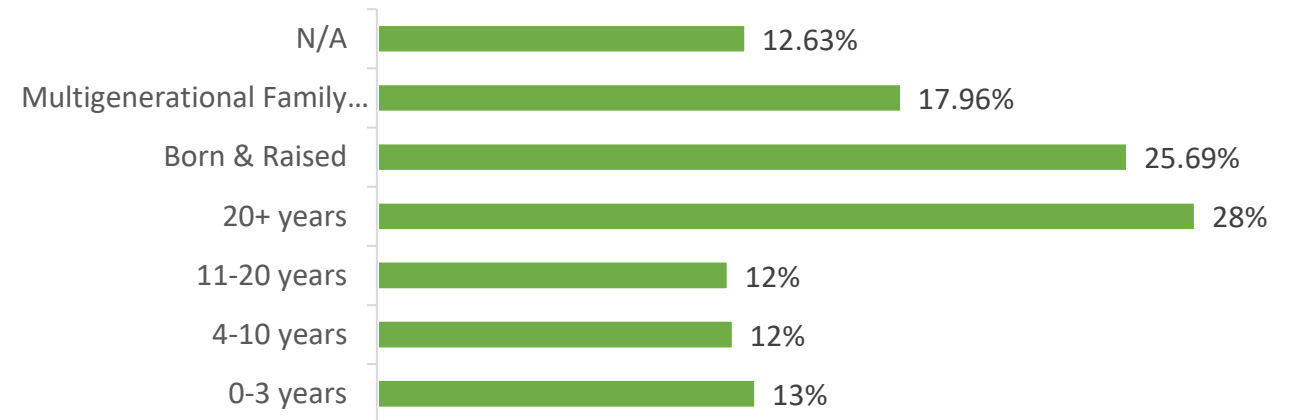

Respondent Demographics

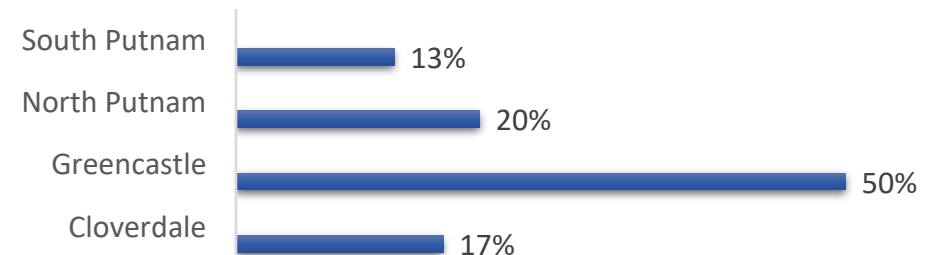
Respondents by Age Group



“How Long Have You Lived in Putnam County?”



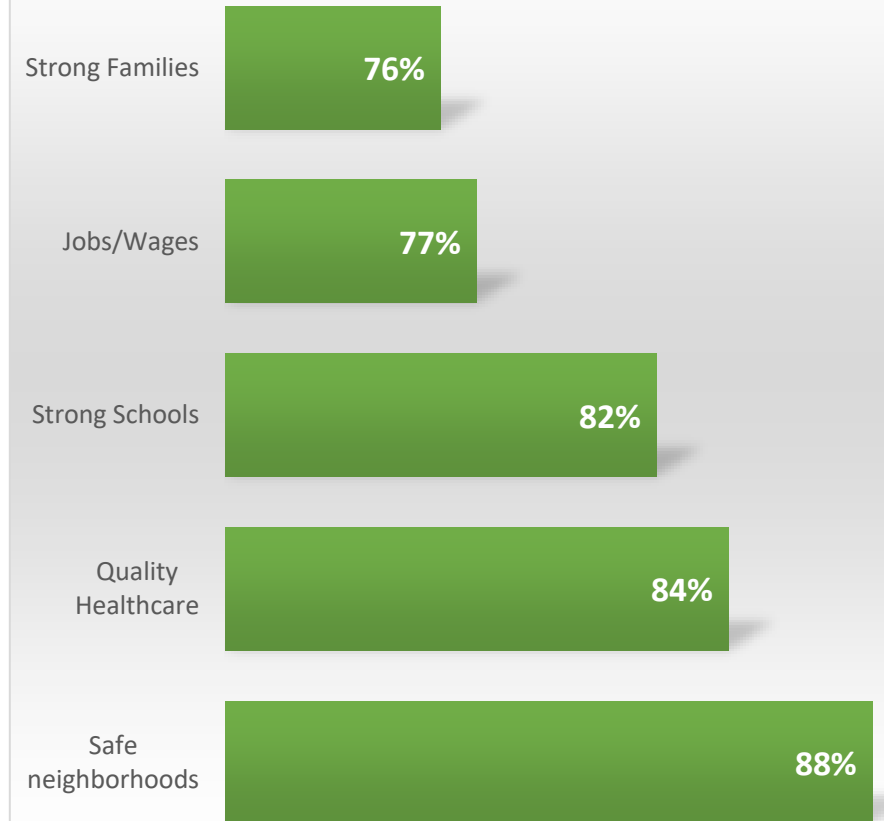

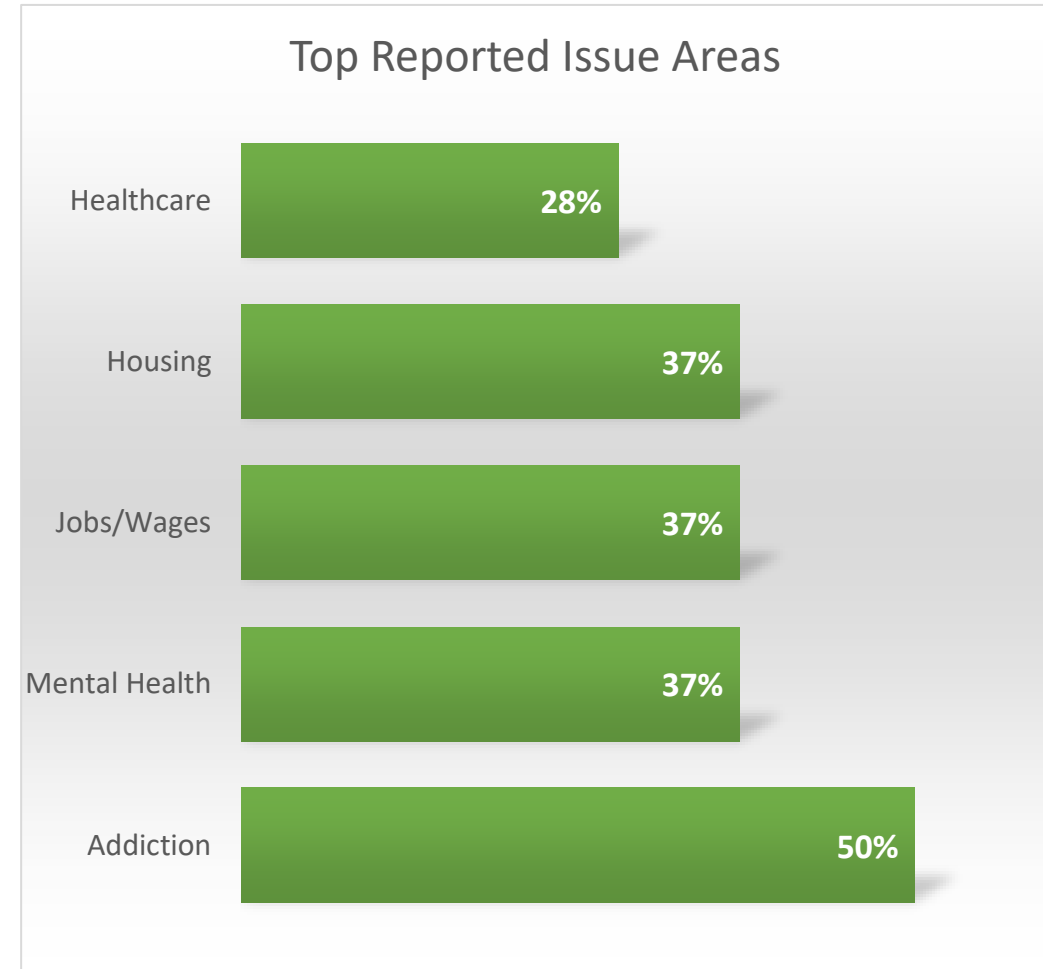

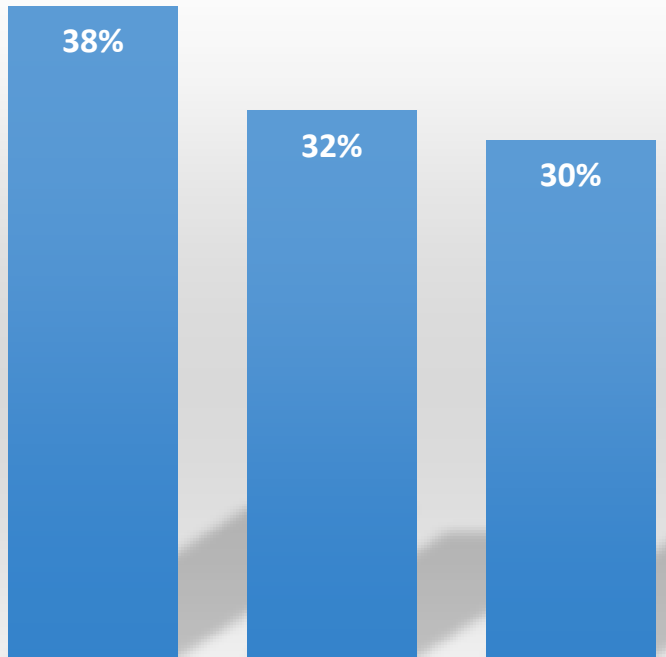

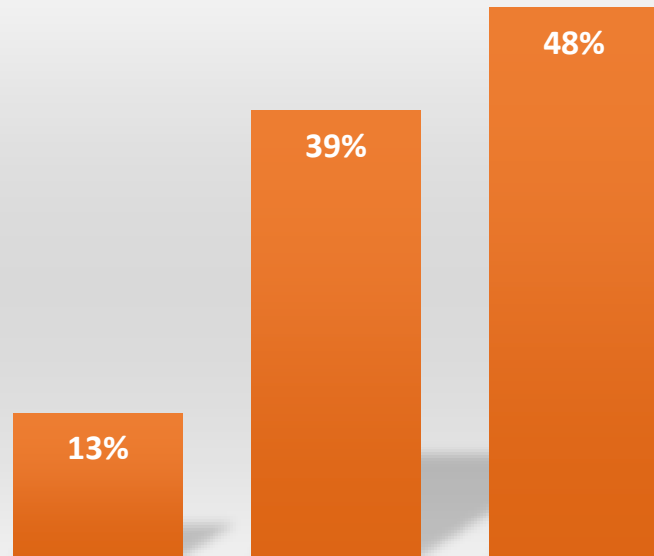

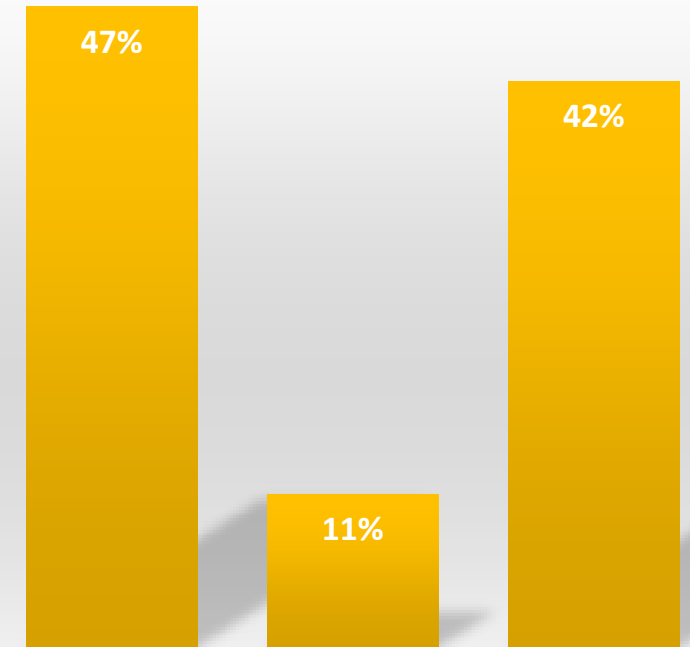

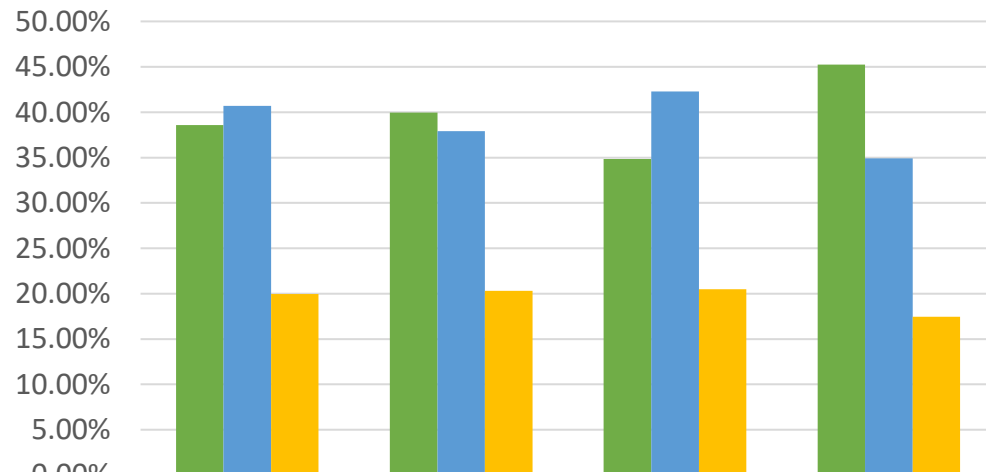

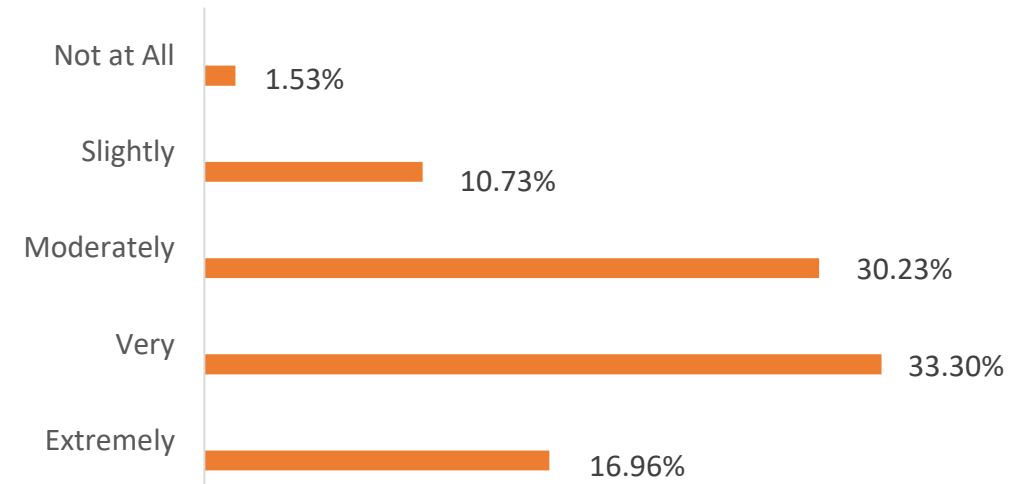

“How connected do you feel to Putnam County?”



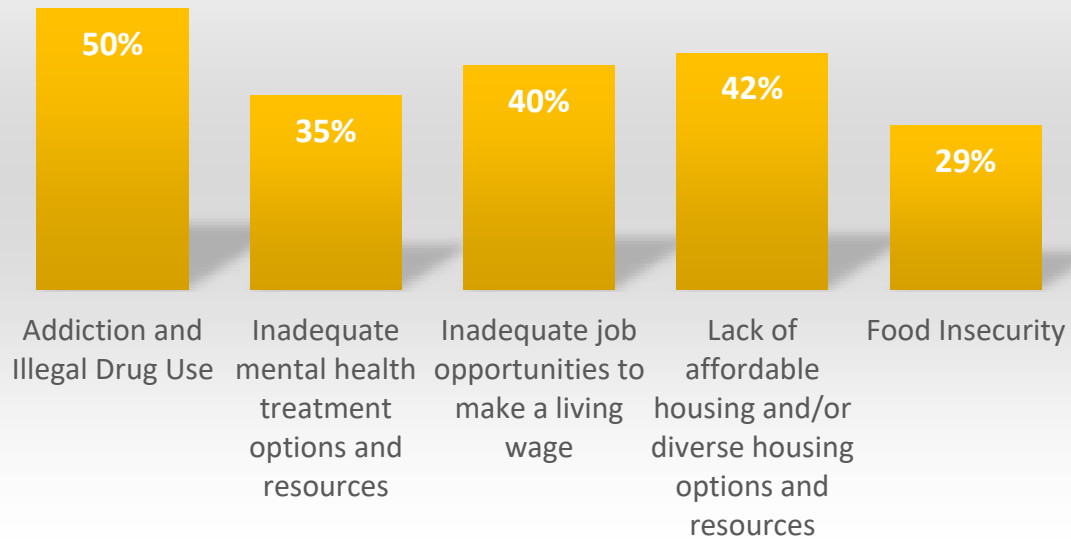

“How willing are you to actively engage in making your community a better place?”



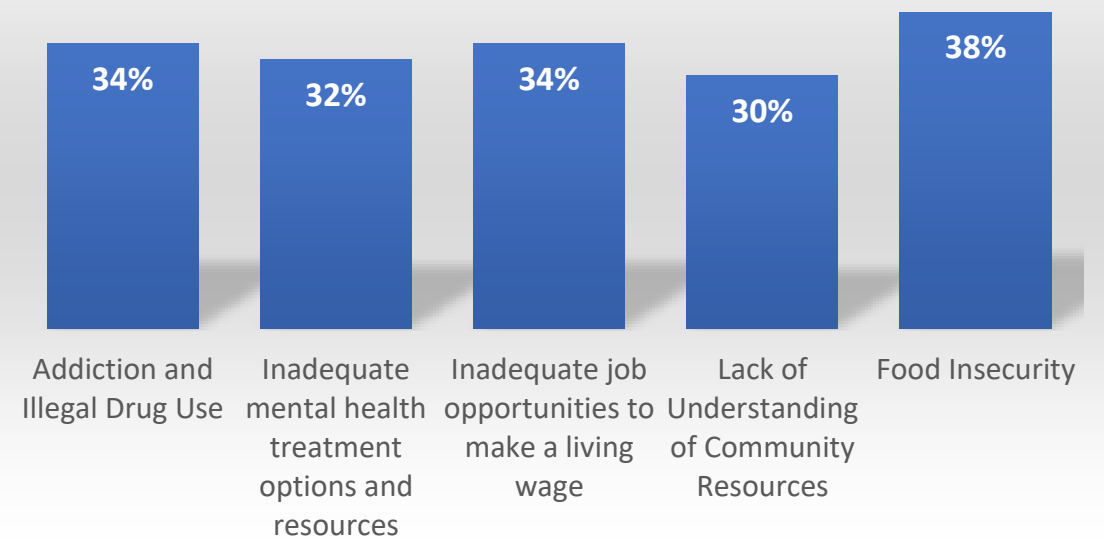
Raising Community Voices

What's Missing?

We didn't hear:

- Male voice (22.5%)
- Youth voice (2.26%)
- Low-income voice (26.93%)

We didn't ask:

- LGBTQ+
- Education level
- Job status
- Household details

What's next?

- Publish final Community Needs Assessment report in December 2023
- Realign grantmaking and other programs to better address top needs
- Make comprehensive local data available to public in 2024
- Regularly convene local leaders working to address areas of top need
- Connect regional and state leaders working to address areas of top need to local leaders
- Make large scale investment and seek additional support for a special project to address issues within areas of top need
